VERY FINE APPEARANCE. THIS IS THE EARLIEST EXAMPLE OF THE FORES'S COMIC ENVELOPE USED WITH A PENNY BLACK WHICH IS AVAILABLE TO COLLECTORS. VERY FEW ARE KNOWN.

The British Pictorial Envelopes of the 19th Century book records a total of 20 used examples of the Fores's Comic Envelope. The earliest reported use (May 20) bears two 2p Blues. Two others were used on May 25 but one is in the Royal Collection and the other has had the original stamp removed and replaced. Therefore, this is the earliest example available to collectors used with the Penny Black.





Mulready Envelopes and Lettersheets

- 1d & 2d Mulready Envelope and Lettersheets were introduced alongside the 1d Black on 6 May 1840
- 1d Lettersheet dated 6 May 1840 used within London
- The design was immediately ridiculed in the press and by the public

 How kind of Mr Mulready to not confine this envelope to the bin, so it may be seen for posterity!

















US Propaganda Envelopes US Civil War Envelopes

- Built on experience of using the mail to promote both nationally and internationally the five moral causes
- A multitude of US publishers created designs to promote the Union and Confederate causes in the US Civil War of 1861-1865 with colourful propaganda envelopes
- Estimated up to 15,000 different recorded designs
- Estimated 40,000 copies still in circulation (15,000 used and 25,000 unused) with perhaps 50% in a poor condition
- A further collection of visually interesting selected US Civil War Envelopes is a natural follow on from Mulready Caricatures and GB Propaganda Envelopes

Mulready Caricatures & Propaganda Envelopes Database (1)

Adjusted Mulready Caricatures

- 10% of recorded Mulready Caricatures have been adjusted
- Many Caricatures were held in scrap books, some with the adhesive retained and others with the adhesive removed
- Those with an adhesive removed have sometimes had an adhesive added to reflect the perceived original franking, sometimes recorded as such and sometimes not
- This research has discovered the history of many caricatures where adjustments have been made
- 90% of Mulready Caricatures and the associated Pictorial Envelopes are genuine so they represent a worthwhile eye catching sector to collect!
- But "caveat emptor" is still wise advice!

Adjusted Propaganda Envelopes

- Proportionately far less Propaganda Envelopes have been recorded as adjusted, perhaps less than 2%, but research is ongoing as the 2nd book is written
- Propaganda Envelopes are less costly than Mulready Caricatures and so are less open to fraudulent adjustment for monetary gain








